Nuclear power provides a positive impact on local and regional economies.

The V.C. Summer Nuclear Station has long been a good corporate citizen to Jenkinsville, Fairfield County, and to the region. More than 800 employees work at the plant and live in close proximity, and the company currently pays Fairfield County more than \$19 million a year in property taxes for V.C. Summer — tax dollars that benefit schools, roads and other local infrastructure.

Even beyond tax revenues, the economic benefits of adding two more units will be substantial. The construction phase could employ approximately 3,000 to 4,000 people for three to four years, and the operation of the plant is expected to add approximately 800 to 1,000 full-time workers to the site — all of whom will live and spend their money in the Midlands.

V.C. Summer provides numerous economic benefits to the region. But a price tag cannot be placed on what the plant means to the community. For the plant employees and their families, it means giving back to the community in which they live and work. SCE&G and V.C. Summer employees are involved with numerous organizations and charities in Fairfield, Lexington, Richland and Newberry counties including the American Cancer Society, Harvest Hope Food Bank, Meals on Wheels, March of Dimes, Junior Achievement and the United Way. Those partnerships will only grow stronger with the addition of new units.
